Wherever he is, at work or play, or at the various functions where he's requested to bring the sounds of Scotland to

enhance the day, such as competitions, corporate functions, charitable organisations, military parades, weddings, dinners, funerals and surprise parties and so on, Tony always promotes the Society as well as the Band. Many is the time when no fee is asked or given. This doesn't mean that 'freebies' are dished out willy-nilly but Tony loves piping and will help where he can to promote specific causes.

While he was in Kimberley he was Pipe Major of the CBC Kimberley Pipe Band for a year. In 2000, Tony became Pipe Major of the Cape Town Caledonian Pipe Band and took part in the Millennium March in Edinburgh in aid of Marie Curie Cancer Care. 2002 saw Tony performing at the Edinburgh Military Tattoo with the

Cape Town Highlanders. From 2003 to 2008 he was Pipe Major of the Cape Field Artillery Pipes and Drums and played with them at the Opening of Parliament in 2008. In the same year he took part in the Music of the Night Concert in Plymouth, England. In 2005 and in 2008 saw Tony performing again at the Edinburgh Military Tattoo but, this time, with the South African Irish Regiment Pipe Band.



2009 saw him performing at the South African Tattoo and in 2011 he was with the South African Regiment Pipe Band again performing at the Basel Tattoo in Switzerland. An interesting interlude is that in 2012 a 6/8 marching tune was composed under Tony's name by a member of the famous Red Hot Chilli Pipers, Kyle Stuart Howie.



As can be seen, Tony' piping career spans a long period, albeit with a break of some 12 years after 1978 (too busy playing football?).

In the latter years, and throughout all the performances on the pipes, Tony is



happily married to Lesley, who plays the drums in the Cape Town Caledonian Pipe Band and also dances Highland and Irish dance. They have a son, Brogan, who's also learning the drums, and Tony has another two sons, Brett and Bevan, from a



previous marriage.

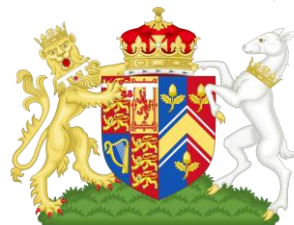
Margaret's son, Paul Emsley, the well-known international portrait artist was visiting her in South Africa when he received an urgent call to return to London. When he landed there he found out that he was one of five artists short-listed to paint a portrait of Kate, the Duchess of Cambridge. The decision was made and Paul was commissioned to paint the portrait. It was reported in the press that: "Award-winning

artist Paul Emsley painted Middleton against his trademark black background with a slight smile, framed by her long locks. Emsley said he wanted to capture Middleton's natural beauty. Emsley said he was originally going to paint the mother-to-be without a smile, but changed his mind shortly after meeting her.

"I think it was the right choice in the end to have her smiling. That's really who she is, I think," said Emsley, who was born in Scotland and grew up in South Africa. Emsley also took liberties with Middleton's eye colour, changing it slightly to match the blouse she is wearing in the painting."

"Duchess of Cambridge Kate Middleton and Prince William visited the National Portrait Gallery in London for the unveiling of her first official portrait. It was a rare appearance for the Duchess of Cambridge, who was released from the hospital in December, as she battles severe morning sickness known as hyperemesis gravidarum."

NEWS FROM SCOTLAND

Scotland to be offered independence or a sugary snack?

SCOTLAND'S referendum will offer the country a choice between independence and some delicious confectionery. David Cameron and Alex Salmond, Scotland's roly poly first minister, will today sign a historic agreement that will lead to either the end of the union or millions of chocolate-covered faces.



After months of tense negotiations the UK and Scottish governments have agreed on the terms of the referendum. However it was the definition of 'snack' which proved the biggest obstacle to an agreement, with the UK insisting a lollipop would be sufficient while officials in Edinburgh initially suggested a 14 foot-long Swiss roll.

The referendum will now ask: "Do you want Scotland to be independent or would you like a Twix?"

Julian Cook, professor of pointless questions at Roehampton University, said: "There was a long, bitter argument about whether the snack should be sweet or savoury. Whitehall made a derisory offer of some Wotsits; while the SNP pushed for a 'bridie', which is a Scottish version of a Cornish pasty that refuses to acknowledge the existence of vegetables and is made of hamsters. Cook added: "Cameron does seem to have won a tactical victory by granting the vote to thousands of fat Scottish teenagers." Meanwhile, research suggests that an independent Scotland will spend all of its oil money on crisps and chocolate within the first month.

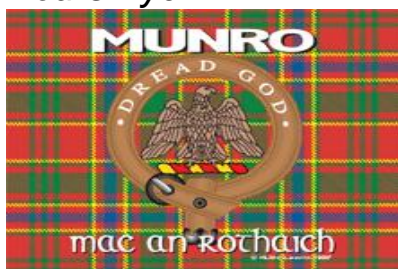
